

— Jack Nicholson as Col. Nathan R. Jessup in "A Few Good Men" (1992) How no one outside of healthcare supply chain understands what happens around, in and to Supply Chain.

11. "Coffee's for closers only."

— Alec Baldwin as Blake in "Glengarry Glen Ross" (1992) That may be for sales, but for healthcare supply chain, it's all about Amp, Five-Hour Energy, Liquid Death, Monster and/or Red Bull. Stirred, not shaken.

10. "So you're telling me there's a chance?"

Jim Carrey as Lloyd Christmas in "Dumb and Dumber" (1994)

 — Ian McKellen as Gandalf in "The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring" (2001)
